Introduction

"What can I do with a Health and Social Care degree?"

If you're asking yourself these questions then we would advise you to research your career choices as thoroughly and as early as possible, particularly in relation to experience required, different career routes you can explore or where postgraduate study choices can develop future opportunities.

Three ways you will succeed in finding a graduate job:

- 1. Undertaking paid work whilst at university or in the six months immediately after
- 2. Focusing your job search exclusively on graduate level jobs and making your applications whilst still studying
- 3. Having a career plan upon leaving university

I have a degree, now what?

If you don't know what career you want when you graduate, you may have more options than you think. Having a degree opens you up to many graduate level jobs and postgraduate study, which doesn't specifically have to be in healthcare, as many industries are open to graduates from any degree background. So, explore your options!

Career Decision Making

Your first step should be to bridge the gap between where you are and where you want to be. Exploring your values, interests, and skills will help you find educational and career options that match up with your goals and plan for the future.

How to gain experience

Whatever career area you're interested in, finding some short-term paid or voluntary work will improve your prospects of getting a job and can give you a valuable insight into how a company or organisation operates. Volunteering demonstrates commitment and is an excellent way to gain experience in dealing with individuals, children, families and caring for vulnerable groups.

You can seek opportunities to get healthcare experience in your local hospital, doctor's surgery, day centres or schools and nursing homes. If you like to work with children, you could volunteer in schools, summer camps, youth clubs and local sports teams. Experience of mentoring, counselling, or befriending may also be useful for social work and related careers.

Victim support organisations, homeless shelters and mental health charities such as Mind provides valuable experience for those hoping to work with vulnerable groups as well as phone line counsellor roles for charities such as ChildLine, Nightline or the Samaritans.

If you're interested in alternative approaches to health and healing, you could explore work experience within a holistic health practice. Volunteering on a health project in a developing country is also valuable career preparation.

Other relevant experience includes working in a community setting or at fitness centres in health promotion or getting involved in more wide-ranging community projects at advice centres, community centres, churches and other faith communities.

A fast-track programme to prepare you to work as a senior manager in healthcare; during the Scheme you are employed on a fixed-term contract and receive a salary.

You can specialise in one of six areas:

- general management
- finance
- human resources
- health informatics
- policy and strategy
- health analysis

Do I need a Postgraduate qualification?

Master's degrees are available in a very wide range of healthcare and public health-related subjects. Some are specifically aimed at people who are already qualified in a certain field, but others are more general and open to those with other qualifications and backgrounds. For many health-related careers, such as Nursing, Social Worker and Occupational Therapy you will need to take a Master's degree in order to qualify in your profession.
